### Stephen C. Buckley, Esq., Legal Services Counsel New Hampshire Municipal Association

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Stephen C. Buckley directs NHMA's legal services program as Legal Services Counsel, with responsibility for providing legal advice to members and overseeing training programs and educational publications for municipal officials. He was in the private practice of law from 1984 to 2014 concentrating in representing municipalities. In his hometown of Bow, Steve was a member of the planning board for 12 years and served as a member of the budget committee, and he currently serves as a member on the Zoning Board of Adjustment. He is a past chairman and current member of the executive committee of the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission, and he is currently a representative to the New Hampshire Association of Regional Planning Commissions. Steve received his B.A. from San Diego State University and his J.D. from UNH School of Law.

# Andrew Cushing, Community Preservation Services Manager NH Preservation Alliance
